## Monthly Performance and Portfolio Report – November 2017

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### **Overview**

The Fund returned 1.01% in November 2017, bringing the 1 year return to 21.33%. Over this period the Fund returned \$0.8 billion in excess of the passive Reference Portfolio. As at 30 November 2017 the Fund was worth \$37.38 billion.

- relative to a passive <u>Reference Portfolio</u> benchmark.



## **Performance since inception**

This graph shows what has happened to the first dollar invested in the Fund over time.



Since inception the Guardians have added \$21.7 billion to the Fund, compared to the <u>Treasury</u> <u>Bill return</u>.

Over the same period, as illustrated by the gap between the brown and green lines, the Guardians' active investment strategies have added an estimated \$6.9 billion in value to the Fund, compared to the passive <u>Reference Portfolio</u> benchmark.



## **Performance since inception**

The Fund's long-term performance expectation is that it will beat the <u>Treasury</u> <u>Bill return</u> by at least 2.7% (over rolling 20 year periods). Since inception, the Fund has exceeded the Treasury Bill return by 6.35% p.a.




## Where we invest

### These graphs illustrate the Fund's investments by geographic region.

The left-hand analysis breaks down 'investments', as categorised in the statutory accounts, by their value, excluding foreign exchange hedging instruments such as FX contracts and cross currency swaps, plus investments in rural and forest land.

The right-hand analysis breaks down the Fund as a whole by economic **exposure**, again, excluding hedging instruments, as well as cash; collateral held to back derivative positions; and market neutral investments (e.g. arbitrage trades or hedge funds).

#### Investments by value as at 30/11/2017




